- Shortage of Re-Entry Training Positions
- Absence of Training Support, Induction, Shadowing & Mentoring (soft skills)
- Linguistic, Factual or Procedural 'Ignorance'
- Non-Familiarity with Rural Practice
- Inability to Refresh (No Faculty of Med/ Dentistry)


